The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, which he saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem in the days of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah.

Hear the word of the LORD, you rulers of Sodom! Listen to the teaching of our God, you people of Gomorrah! What to me is the multitude of your sacrifices? Come now, let us argue it out, says the LORD: If your sins are like scarlet, will they become like snow? If they are red like crimson, will they become like wool? If you are willing

and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land, but if you refuse and rebel, you shall be devoured by the sword, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

SCRIPTURE Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16 Joe Krider (8:30am)

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance, and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith, with Sarah's involvement, he received power of procreation, even though he was too old, because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better homeland, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

"Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

"Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night or near dawn and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.

"But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect."

SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "YOU MUST BE READY"

What is your style?

Some people believe that we do not need to fix what is not broken. Some people, however, believe that we need to prevent accidents before they happen. Do you support a major financial campaign to repair a roof when we have leakage or save money annually for 50 years to replace the roof one time?

Prophets cried out for repair!

When we read the prophetic books, we learn that they talked about a leaking roof. The nation was already broken, and the prophets urged people to repent to repair the nation.

Isaiah was a prophet during the reigns of 4 kings of Juda (Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah). Isaiah called these kings "rulers of Sodom," and the people as "people of Gomorrah!" As we know, these two cities were destroyed by fire in Genesis 13 and used as symbols of wickedness in the Bible.

The most serious sins of these two cities were sins of inhospitality. They did not welcome their guests, but they harmed them with violence. Because of these sins, God says, "The multitude of your sacrifices—what are they to me?" God declared all the religious ceremonies and rites as meaningless and "even when you offer many prayers, I am not listening."

God wants to see people practice social justice when they worship God. God demanded justice, saying, "Learn to do right; seek justice." Then how do we seek justice? God answered, "Defend the oppressed. Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow."

That is how to repair a broken nation. We need to pay attention to the poor, the homeless, the oppressed before our nation collapses. I ask politicians, policy makers, and experts among our church members to offer practical solutions to the issues of homelessness and poverty. I am willing and ready to support their practical suggestions with prayer and offerings.

God is ready to forgive our sins and move forward.

When we repent our sins of selfishness and pay attention to those poor and oppressed people in our communities, God will forgive our sins. God says, "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool. If you are willing and obedient, you will eat the good things of the land; but if you resist and rebel, you will be devoured by the sword."

History tells us that Israel did not listen to God.

Even though Isaiah had given warnings to the kings for more than half a century, Israel did not listen to God and continued their sins. They did not pay attention to the poor. Then it was destroyed by Babylon in 587 BC. They became diaspora without their own nation for two thousand five hundred years. In 1948, they became a new nation, Israel.

It would be much better to repair a roof before it leaks. God is the God who gives warnings. God does not make a surprise attack on anybody. God proclaimed and laid out clear principles for everybody and gives enough warnings in advance. We can take time to think about it before we experience the consequences of our actions.

Do we need to solve the poverty issue completely to prevent the demise of our nation?

No. We do not need to solve the poverty issue completely. We are not able to do that. God knows that we are incompetent. Even with best intent, we hurt others and make mistakes. Poverty is a complex issue. However, God wants us to pay attention to the people who are in need.

John Wesley said, "Do all the goods you can, to all the people you can, with all the means you can, at all the times you can, by all the means you can, as long as you can." We are all sinners and not perfect. That is all we can, and God knows it.

Genesis 6:5 says, "The Lord saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time." However, after the flood, God said, "Never again will I curse the ground because of humans, even though every inclination of the human heart is evil from childhood." (Genesis 8:21) "Whenever I bring clouds over the earth and the rainbow appears in the clouds, I will remember my covenant between me and you and all living creatures of every kind (Genesis 9:14).

We need to dream of and work for the community where we can live together.

God does not expect us to solve the poverty issue completely. God wants us to dream of and work for the community where we can live together. Hebrews 11:1 says, "Faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see."

When we hope for a beloved community, it is our faith that God will make it happen among us. Even though we do not know how to achieve the goal, we are sure that God will guide us there. That is our faith. Our faith journey is a process. Our ancestors already walked this road with faith.

Let us examine the life of Abraham and Sarah.

Hebrews 11:8-10 says, "By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed, and went, even though he did not know where he was going. By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God."

It continues the story. "And by faith even Sarah, who was past childbearing age, was enabled to bear children because she considered him faithful who had made the promise. And so from this one couple came descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sand on the seashore."

Abraham and Sarah actually did not see the land and the descendants.

Hebrews says that they were still living by faith when they died. This is the point. "They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that they were foreigners and strangers on earth."

We may not achieve a community where everybody has equality (same resources). However, we can build up a community where everybody has equity (equal opportunities). People should have equal opportunity and fair rules of competition.

When people lose, there should be some social safety net. Even a monkey can fall from a tree. Minimum and basic necessities should be available to everybody in all communities. In our nation, we have a federal welfare system for that. Some people hate those who receive welfare benefits. Then ask this question: "Do I want to be on the giving side or receiving side?" When we are on the giving side,

we should be thankful and give joyfully. When we are on the receiving side, we should receive it with much appreciation.

Jesus taught us to pray for "daily bread" and "forgiveness" for everybody. That is the basic "physical" and "spiritual" needs of everybody.

We need sacrifice of the rich people to build up such beloved community.

It is inevitable for us to have differences. However, we do not need to show discrimination. Some people have talents, treasure, and time more than others. Some people were born with physical and mental challenges. There is no way for them to compete in a free capitalistic society and win their places. There are mountains and valleys in nature. We all have ups and downs in life. Some people are rich and some people are poor in societies. We cannot prevent these discrepancies from happening, and make everything flat and equal. That is not what God wants. God makes us colorful with many shapes and colors.

However, when we are doing well, we can consider the poor. We can even sacrifice our time, talents, and treasure to help others out. Hebrews says that people who do sacrifice their time, talents, and treasure are "longing for a better country—a heavenly one." They consider the life beyond this earthly life. "Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them."

We are citizens of God's Kingdom.

Jesus said in Luke 12:32-40, "Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions and give to the poor. Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will never fail, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Jesus did not say here, "Sell **all** your possessions and give to the poor." Jesus once said that to a young rich man. "Sell some of your possessions and follow me!" However, here Jesus says, "Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out!" We can have our purses.

Practically, our goal is to give ten percent of our income to our missions and ministries. 90% of our income is at our disposal. We are willing to give 10% of our income to God. However, if you do not have joy in giving, you are not ready to give 10%. Give only what you can give with joy. If you give with complaints, it becomes a law. We give taxes whether we like it or not because it is a law. Offering is different from tax.

We give tax because we are citizens of our country. We give offering because we are citizens of God's Kingdom. Paying tax is a legal duty. Giving offering is a means of Grace, through which we experience joy and express our faith. We can grow spiritually through giving.

We reveal our values when we spend our money.

When people want to know where their priorities in life are, I ask them to show me their budget and schedule book. Then I can tell them where their priorities are. I emphasize our committee chairs to make their committee budget and bring it to the Church Council. Our budgets will show where our hearts are. Budgets are a condition of our spiritual health. We can check our spiritual health with them. It shows our faith in action.

We need to live like our Lord will come back any time.

When we have faith in life beyond our bodily life, we will organize our life here on Earth also differently. We live as if Jesus comes back any time.

Jesus said, "Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning, like servants waiting for their master to return from a wedding banquet, so that when he comes and knocks they can immediately open the door for him. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them watching when he comes. Truly I tell you, he will dress himself to serve, will have them recline at the table and will come and wait on them. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them ready, even if he comes in the middle of the night or toward daybreak. But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him."

Let us take time to reflect on our budget and schedule to see if we are ready to go to meet our Lord. Amen.
