"FRIENDS, MOVE UP HIGHER!" (Luke 14:1, 7-14)

Jesus is the only way to God.

I have received questions like these: If we are saved by Jesus alone, what happen to those who were born before Jesus or those who have never heard about Jesus?

I give them three choices.

- 1. All of them will be saved. A loving God would save all humans. Love wins. (Universalist)
- 2. I am sorry. They were not saved. The Bible says that only those who believe in Jesus will be saved. We were all dead anyway. Those who believed in Jesus should be saved. (Exclusivist)
- 3. Those who have heard about Jesus can make their choice. However, we cannot make people responsible for their choice if they have never heard about Jesus. A just God would figure out some ways to save those who have never heard about Jesus. (Pietistic Agnostics)

Universalists do not provide any ethical foundation. If everybody is saved, we do not worry about God's judgement on our action and life. This can lead to antinomianism. People can do whatever they want to do because God does not judge according to our actions. About 10 % of the population takes this position.

On the other hand, exclusivists sound like judgmental and non-caring people. They say, "All humans have been dead because the first Adam violated God's law. We should not complain about the death of those people who have been dead. We should give thanks for the lives saved." About 10 % of population takes this position.

The remaining 80% take one of the forms of the Pietistic Agnostics. They believe that God will provide some form of salvation to those who did not hear about Jesus. That is fair. However, those who heard about Jesus should believe in Jesus to be saved. You had a chance to choose life. However, people have different opinions about the ways how God saves people.

God would save humble people!

Here is one clue. In the Gospel lesson, Jesus gives us an illustration. One Sabbath, when Jesus noticed how the guests picked the places of honor at the table, he told them this parable: "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this person your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up to a better place.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all the other guests. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

This is a teaching about humility. When we are humble God will lift us up! However, this is not the end.

God would save generous people!

Jesus takes one more step. Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, your relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

When we practice mercy without expecting reward we will be saved. In these two illustrations, the key words are humility and mercy. Jesus first, Others second, You the last will give you JOY! JOY of Salvation!

Actually God is humble enough to come to us in human form, and merciful enough to die on the Cross to save us. God acted out what God expected from us.

Faith in Jesus means "Acting justly, loving mercy, and walking humbly with God." (Micah 6:8) Before Jesus came to us in flesh, we had clear guideline for salvation in Micah 6:8. Jesus summarized it with two commandments: "Love God and love your neighbor." When we love God, we act justly. When we love our neighbors, we practice mercy. All these are expressed in walking humbly with God. In other words, when we help others, we do not boast or show off. Micah is saying "Love your God and love your neighbor in humility."

Anybody who confesses that they need God's grace and mercy would be saved.

Let us go back to the original question. Those who were born before Jesus or who never heard about Jesus would be saved when they confess that they need God's grace and mercy. On the other hand, those who practice all kinds of religious practices and feel that they earned their salvation by their works would not be saved. If someone says, "I am fine, I do not need God!" that is the one that God does not save.

Jeremiah 2:4-13 describes these people. "They followed worthless idols and became worthless themselves. They did not ask, 'Where is the Lord, who brought us up out of Egypt and led us through the barren wilderness, through a land of deserts and ravines, a land of drought and utter darkness, a land where no one travels, and no one lives?"

Jeremiah criticizes those people who do not give credit to God for what they have enjoyed in life.

God says, "Therefore I bring charges against you again, and I will bring charges against your children's children." God says, "My people have committed two sins: They have forsaken me, the spring of living water, and have dug their own cisterns, broken cisterns that cannot hold water."

Do we still need good works?

Do not get me wrong. We still support good works. Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16 says, "Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering."

Even though salvation depends on God's mercy and grace, we need to keep our communities with our works. Works are needed to keep our communities. God's mercy is given for our salvation. Works and Grace have two distinctive functions for two different goals.

We need ethical behaviors to maintain our communities.

The basic community is our family in many forms. The Bible supports families. Marriage is the starting point of a family. That is why the Bible treats marriage seriously. It is a covenantal relationship between two consenting adults. The Bible says, "Marriage should be honored by all, and the marriage bed kept pure, for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral."

We should keep such covenantal relationship with God also. The Bible says, "Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have." Money is not our helper. Money comes and goes to live with other money lovers. However, God lovers would say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can mere mortals do to me?"

Leaders of our small groups and our church would be role models in this covenantal relationship with God. They speak the word of God to us and prove their leadership through the outcome of their way of life. We all can imitate their faith.

What is the difference between Christianity and other religions then?

If we support good works and humility and mercy saves us, why do we need Jesus? What is the difference between Christianity and other religions? I am glad that you asked this question. When someone says that "My good works are not good enough to save me!" there is no difference between Christianity and other religions. If someone says, "I have earned my salvation through my good works" then we have a clear difference.

Some religions claim that their good works save them. We declare that all our good works will help our communities but will not save us. Only Jesus saves us and anybody who requests help from God.

God sent his only begotten Son to save all who believe in him!

The Bible says, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." That means Jesus can save those who asked for help even before Jesus came to us in flesh. The salvific effect of the blood of Jesus on the Cross can save all those who were born before Jesus and all those who have never heard about Jesus. When they simply ask God's mercy and grace, acknowledging their helplessness, they will be saved by the blood of Jesus, which covers all time and space.

Jesus Is not limited by our dimensions.

We live in this third dimension within the time limits. God is not limited by our dimensions and times. God is the creator of all the dimensions and even times. Some people ask, "What did God do before God created the universe?" God was creating times and dimensions. That is why the salvific effect of the Cross can cross over time and dimensions.

The Bible encourages us, "Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess his name. And do not forget to do good and to share with others, for with such sacrifices God is pleased."

In summary, do good works and do not boast about them. Always praise God who accepts our "good" works even though they are not good. Parents always praise the performance of their children because they love their children. Always give credit to God and praise God who saves us from the power of sin and death. Embrace all the religions that admit God's grace. Reject all the others who do not want God's grace and claim the goodness of their works. God is the one who helps us to keep our hope, peace, joy, and love. Amen.
