

SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "THE LORD NEEDS THEM!"

What do you see?

When Jesus was entering Jerusalem, people thought that Jesus was a prophet or a Messiah. When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

In the Jewish tradition, a prophet was one of the anointed ones. Kings, priests, and prophets were anointed with oil when they were called to do God's works. Messiah in Hebrew simply meant an "anointed one." Kings, priests, and prophets were all Messiahs in this sense.

When people thought that Jesus was the prophet from Nazareth in Galilee, they had great expectation that Jesus would restore the glorious Davidic Kingdom of the old times. They saw Jesus performing many miracles, healing the sick, teaching and interpreting the Torah and Prophets, and proclaiming the coming of the Kingdom of God. All these actions gave them the perception that Jesus was the Messiah whom they had been waiting for. They saw the Messiah in Jesus.

What do you do?

With that expectation, they welcomed Jesus. Jesus was able to get what he needed when people thought that Jesus would be a king soon. When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately."

And the owner of the donkey did! He gave his donkey to the disciples whom Jesus sent. They knew that this took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet:

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

Faithful Jewish people knew the old prophecy. They knew five books of Moses (Torah) and the prophets (Nebi'im). It was a fulfillment of prophecy. Jesus rode a donkey to fulfill this prophecy, which predicted the coming of the Messiah.

Then why did Zechariah say that a Messiah would ride a donkey? Donkey was a symbol of humility. Donkeys were typically used by common people for transportation, while horses were used by the wealthy and powerful. By choosing to ride a donkey, Jesus was making a statement about his humility and his identification with the poor and marginalized.

More importantly, it was also a message of peace. In ancient times, military generals would ride horses when entering a city to show their power and intention to conquer the town. In contrast, riding a donkey was a sign of peace and goodwill. By riding a donkey into Jerusalem, Jesus was sending a message of peace and reconciliation. They welcomed Jesus and accepted him as their king!

Disciples brought the donkey and the colt and put their cloaks on them, and Jesus sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Would you welcome Jesus into your life?

So far so good. We have palm leaves, waiving them to welcome Jesus into our lives. We expect great victory with Jesus in our lives. However, do you know that Jesus did not promise all the money, power, fame, and success in this world?

Jesus did not guarantee us freedom from all the troubles in the world. There was a misunderstanding about Jesus. The Jerusalem people and the followers of Jesus did not understand that Jesus was going to die on the Cross to free us from the power of sin and death. The people then and now followed Jesus to get what their flesh desires. In other words, many people then and now follow Jesus to get money, power, fame, and success in this world.

When Jesus entered Jerusalem, the people were expecting him to be a political Messiah who would overthrow the Roman occupation and establish a Jewish kingdom. They were looking for a powerful military leader who would lead them to victory and restore Israel's glory.

However, Jesus had a different calling. He did not come to establish an earthly kingdom, but a Kingdom of God. He preached about love, forgiveness, and salvation, and he challenged the religious and political authorities of his time. His message was not about political power or military conquest but about transforming people's hearts and minds. His Beatitude shows this clearly.

The discrepancy between the people's expectations and Jesus' calling led to a lot of confusion and conflict. Many people who initially welcomed Jesus as a messiah later turned against him when they realized that he did not fit their expectations. This eventually led to his arrest, trial, and crucifixion.

They were disappointed by the helpless death of Jesus on the Cross. However, Jesus came to die on the Cross to save all creation! If we do not understand this calling that Jesus had, we will also be very disappointed. We will not welcome Jesus into our lives, either. We will also crucify Jesus on the Cross.

A litmus test of our faith.

When my mother started a church in Jeju Island in South Korea, she did not know how strong the wind was at a seaside village. She could not afford to build a church, but someone donated a tent for her. She put up a tent and used the tent as a meeting place. It was fine until Typhoon season started. When she heard the weather forecast, she put heavy rocks around the tent. She thought that those rocks would hold the tent down. At night, however, she felt strong winds. When she woke up, she saw the tent flying into the sky with all the other things in the tent. She held onto a rock so that she would not be flying away with the tent. Everything else was gone, gone with the wind!

She could not believe what happened at night. She just crouched on the ground and started praying. She heard God's voice saying, "The Lord needs it." It was one of the scriptures that she read the night before. It was the scripture that we read today.

She went to Seoul, the capital city of South Korea. She shared her ministry passion with other church members in Seoul. She asked for donations to build a church building, quoting the scripture, "The Lord needs it." She was

able to raise \$100,000 to build a church. People responded to her. It was her donkey. She built a brick building at the place where the tent stood. It was evidence of people's generosity and God's love.

Special Easter Offering Benefiting Children and Families at Central Methodist Nursery School

This year, the Central Methodist Nursery School (CMNS) is celebrating 60 years of serving children and their families in the community. Currently, they are serving children and families from all walks of life with a current enrollment of 94 children.
