MOTHERS' STORIES Mother's Day

Today we celebrate Mother's Day. **Anna Jarvis** was born in 1864 in West Virginia and was one of 13 children. Her mother, **Ann Reeves Jarvis**, was a social activist who worked to improve public health and sanitation in her community, and she also organized <u>Mother's Day work clubs</u> to promote unity and peace during the Civil War. After her mother's death in 1905, Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother's memory and continue her work. She began campaigning for a national holiday to honor all mothers, and in **1914**, **President Woodrow Wilson** signed a proclamation officially recognizing **Mother's Day** as a national holiday in the United States.

So, today we will hear many mothers' stories. I shared my mother's story at the 60th anniversary of the Central Methodist Nursery School. I will just connect **mothers' lives** with the **works of the Holy Spirit**. It is said that **God wants to be with everybody, and God sends a mother to each home**. When I read the scripture for today, I realized that we could put the word, "mother" in the place of the Holy Spirit.

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and God will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is **the Spirit of truth**, whom the world cannot receive because it neither sees the **Spirit** nor knows the **Spirit**. You know the Spirit (mother) because the **Spirit** abides with you, and the **Spirit** will be in you."

If I rewrite this it will be like this: "If you truly love me, you will obey my commands. And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Helper, who will remain with you always. This is your mother. The world cannot receive her because it neither sees nor knows her. However, you know her intimately, for she dwells within you and will continue to be a constant presence in your life."

Father God created us, Son Jesus saved us, but it is the Holy Spirit, Mother, who nurtured us and guides us in daily faith journey!

Justification (Salvation) and Sanctification (Mission and Ministry)

Sometimes people ask me whether salvation is a "once-in-life time experience" or an "ongoing" experience. It depends on whether we use the term salvation, in a narrow sense or in a broader sense.

In a narrow sense, salvation means <u>justification</u>, a one-time event. Jesus died for us on the Cross and we are justified when we accept Jesus as our Savior. In a <u>broader</u> sense, salvation means <u>sanctification</u>, a life-long journey. After we are justified and regarded as a child of God and an heir of God's Kingdom, we need to grow in God's love every day until we achieve the <u>Christian Perfection</u> in life. In this Sanctification journey, the Holy Spirit is our guide and nurturer. That was why Jesus sent the Holy Spirit after his ascension.

If I use an analogy, the moment we are born in the USA, we become citizens of the USA. I became a citizen of the USA by naturalization process.

The <u>moment I did the ceremony in front of a federal judge</u>, my status was changed from an alien to a citizen. It was an <u>instantaneous change</u>. It was not a gradual life-long process. However, I still have to learn English and American culture to enjoy my life here in the USA It is a life-long process. In this sense, naturalization takes a lifelong time. This is the same for naturally born citizens. They still have to learn how to speak and write in English and their culture when they grow up in their family and community.

Do not confuse the concept of Salvation with the concept of Sanctification. A conservative Christian uses the word Salvation in a narrower sense. For them, the rest of the faith journey is the Sanctification process. When a progressive Christian uses the word in a broader sense, she/he combines the concept of Justification with the Sanctification. In this case, Salvation is a life-long process. Then we will call Jesus not only as our savior but also our Lord. The Savior saves us once, but the Lord is the one who controls our lives.

Salvation is instantaneous like the moment when you say, "I Do!" in a marriage ceremony. Sanctification is a life-long process like married life. Being born in a family makes us a family member instantly. However, to be a true family member, we need to learn the culture and traditions of our family and contribute to the family finance, culture, and sustainability. This is the work of the Holy Spirit and a mother.

So, today, we are going to hear from church members, what values, what lessons, and what role models they have learned from their mothers. Let us invite our speakers.

(Testimonials from children)

I would end my sermon by reading 1 Peter 3:13-18 with mothers in it.

Now who will harm you, **mothers**, if you are eager to do what is good? But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you yet do it with gentleness and respect.

Maintain a good conscience so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring **children of God to the Father** God. He was put to death in the flesh but made alive in the spirit.

Mothers, your pains and sufferings were not in vain. You have produced God's children for the Kindom of God. May God bless you with hope, joy, peace, and love! Amen!

The Sunday Afternoon Book Group's next read is called *Tastes Like War* by Grace Cho, joining the Big Library Read which connects readers around the world with the same book at the same time. Grace Cho grew up as the daughter of a white American merchant marine and the Korean bar hostess he met abroad They were one of few immigrants in a xenophobic small town during the cold war, where identity was politicized by everyday details. The story is about a daughter's search, through intimate and global history, for the roots of her mother's schizophrenia, Grace learns to cook dishes from her mother's childhood in order to invite the past into the present. In this way Grace discovers not only the things which broke her brilliant mother, but also the things that kept her alive.
