SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "LET ANYONE WHO IS THIRSTY COME TO JESUS."

God gave water to a thirsty people.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus says, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink" (John 7:37-39). This invitation was given during the Feast of Tabernacles, a Jewish festival held to commemorate the time when the Israelites lived in temporary shelters during their wilderness journey after the Exodus from Egypt. In the wilderness, they were always looking for water, and God provided it for them from rocks and led them to still waters. In this sense, Jesus' invitation was appropriate for those who were looking for something to satisfy their thirst.

God gives the Holy Spirit to the thirsty people.

However, we have a different kind of thirst that cannot be quenched by physical water. After Jesus ascended into heaven, the disciples gathered in the Upper Room, waiting for the Holy Spirit. When the Holy Spirit came, they were filled with power and began to speak in other languages. This demonstrated that God was working with diverse people, as people from all over the world heard them speaking in their native language.

This was the moment of the birth of the Christian Church, as three thousand people accepted Jesus as their Savior and Lord on that day. The Holy Spirit gave birth to the Christian Church, and we are born again with many hopes and possibilities. However, just as a newborn baby needs to be nurtured with love and care, we also need to be nurtured by the Holy Spirit and the community of believers.

When we are nurtured in this way, we will see the fruits of the Holy Spirit in our Christian community. These fruits include the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good, such as the utterance of wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, prophecy, and discernment of spirits.

Love is the best fruits of the Holy Spirit

However, the best fruit of the Holy Spirit is love. Love is the foundation of all other fruits and is what enables us to live out our faith in tangible ways. So let us come to Jesus and drink of the water that He offers and let us be nurtured by the Holy Spirit and the community of believers so that we can bear fruit for the glory of God.

Practical examples of Love

In our church meetings, we have a unique opportunity to express love towards one another. Love is not just a feeling, it is an action, and it is demonstrated by how we listen to and respect different opinions. It requires us to put aside our own preferences and allow others to share their thoughts, even if they differ from our own.

Furthermore, we must not be afraid to hear concerns and suggestions that arise during the meeting, even if they are not on the agenda. Love demands that we are open and receptive to the ideas of others, even when they challenge our own views.

But love goes even further than this. It requires us to be humble enough to acknowledge when we have made mistakes, and to express our apologies to those who have pointed them out. Love is not about being right all the time, but about admitting our faults and seeking to grow in grace.

The apostle Paul speaks of love as starting and ending with patience. This means that love enables us to endure hardships and pain, all for the sake of making the other person better. It is through love that we can build up God's beloved community, even amid difficulties.

On this Pentecost, let us pray that the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Love, will come upon us and free us from pride, egotism, stubbornness, paranoia, false accusations, and the desire to control others. May we be transformed by the selfless love of Christ, and may our actions reflect the common good of God's beloved community. Amen.

KINGDOM DREAMS, VIOLENT REALITIES

Sunday, June 4, Central's Adult Class - we begin a new series, one of the most important studies we have ever undertaken. Important because—quite literally—lives hang in the balance. For whatever reasons, violence—particularly gun violence—continues to rage out of control. In 2021, the most recent year for which complete data are available, 48,830 people in the US died of gun-related injuries according to the Centers for Disease Control. This figure includes gun murders, gun suicides and other gun- related deaths. The numbers don't include those injured with guns or otherwise victimized by gun use.

Most of us have been touched by gun violence. Thirty-four years ago, at 11:59 on Tuesday January 17, 1989, the first mass school shooting in the US took place, three blocks from our church. With a semiautomatic refile, the shooter killed five school children and wounded 32 others, including one teacher. Members of our church family were directly impacted.

In this series we'll look at gun violence from through the perspective of our Judeo-Christian heritage. Our guide will be a little-known Hebrew prophet, Micah, who wrote in Palestine some 2800 years ago. His times were bleak economically and politically, times when the superpowers of the age roared and trounced each other, and refugees fled this way and that to avoid the violence. Opportunists took what they wanted; others were left hungry. *Sound familiar*? To this world Micah spoke:

"In days to come...they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more... for the mouth of the LORD of hosts has spoken." ~ Micah 4:1-4 Our study series will be coordinated by Becky Cameron, Central Member and member of *Cleveland School Remembers (CSR)/Brady United Against Gun Violence)*. Our curriculum, *Kingdom Dreams, Violent Realities,* is a Bible study produced by the General Board of Church and Society of The United Methodist Church.

Those who wish to participate will have an opportunity to create a *Soul Box*. Somewhat akin to the AIDS Quilt Project, which created quilts in remembrance of those who died of AIDS, Soul Boxes are created to remember those who have been victims of gun violence.

We hope you'll join us in Knoles Room 6 on Sunday mornings.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON BOOK GROUP

The Sunday Afternoon Book Group's next read is called *Tastes Like War* by Grace Cho, joining the Big Library Read which connects readers around the world with the same book at the same time. Grace Cho grew up as the daughter of a white American merchant marine and the Korean bar hostess he met abroad. They were one of few immigrants in a xenophobic small town during the cold war, where identity was politicized by everyday details. The story is about a daughter's search, through intimate and global history, for the roots of her mother's schizophrenia. Grace learns to cook dishes from her mother's childhood in order to invite the past into the present. In this way Grace discovers not only the things which broke her brilliant mother, but also the things that kept her alive.
