SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "GOD PROVIDES"

Independence Day: Fight for our nation required sacrifice and faith.

On this meaningful Sunday we celebrate our Independence! As we commemorate the fierce struggle of our forefathers against the mighty forces of England, let us reflect upon the remarkable story of our nation's birth.

Almost 250 years ago, our ancestors found themselves facing an overwhelmingly daunting task. They lacked the proper weaponry, resources, military might, and even human power to contend with the formidable British Empire.

Still, our brave ancestors marched forward. They may have been outnumbered, outgunned, and outmaneuvered, but their spirit was unbreakable. It was as if they were saying, "We may not have all the military power, but we've got heart!"

And so, armed with courage and the audacity to dream of a land where freedom would reign, they embarked on a journey that would forever change the course of human history.

And against all odds, their persistence paid off. The seemingly insurmountable became surmountable. So, as we celebrate this Independence Day, let us not only honor the memory of those who paved the way for our freedom, but let their indomitable spirit inspire us to face our own challenges head-on.

Let us remember that even when we feel ill-equipped or outnumbered, we can still make a difference. We can still fight for what we believe in. The story of our nation's birth reminds us that the power to change the world lies not in our circumstances, but in our hearts. And just like our forefathers, let us dare to dream, dare to fight, and dare to believe that against all odds, great things are possible.

God will provide: When we give up our plans, God fulfills God's promises.

This is the faith that we find in Abraham's story. In Genesis 22, we encounter a story of Abraham, a man whose faith and obedience to God were tested like never before. Abraham was called upon by God to make the ultimate sacrifice. He was instructed to take his beloved son, Isaac, to the top of Mount Moriah and offer him as a burnt offering.

The weight of this command must have been unimaginable for Abraham, as he loved his son dearly. Nevertheless, he chose to obey God's will, trusting in His divine plan. It is like our forefathers sent their sons to their battlefield, knowing that many of them might die there.

As they ascended the mountain, Isaac innocently questioned his father, "Father, we have the wood and the fire, but where is the lamb for the offering?" Abraham, filled with love and faith, replied with words that have echoed through the ages, "God will provide, my son." Imagine your son asked you the question, "Father, can I come back alive after this Independence War?" What would you say? "God will guide you and bring you back, son!" I would say.

Abraham's unwavering trust in God's provision resonates with us today. We often find ourselves in situations where we cannot see a way forward, where the path seems dark and uncertain. Whether it is Independence War or life crisis, it is precisely in these moments that our faith and courage are tested.

In the midst of our trials and tribulations, we must remember that God is always working behind the scenes, orchestrating events for our ultimate good. The story of Abraham teaches us that even when the situation appears dire and devoid of hope, God's hand is never absent. He is the ultimate provider, and God's love for us surpasses all understanding.

What happened next on Mount Moriah? As Abraham raised the knife to offer Isaac as a sacrifice, an angel of the Lord called out to him, saying, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him. Now I know that you fear God because you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And there, caught in the thicket, was a ram—a provision from God Himself.

In that moment, Abraham's declaration, "God will provide," became a living reality. God had indeed provided a substitute sacrifice, sparing Isaac's life and reaffirming His promise to bless Abraham's descendants abundantly. The ram caught in the thicket was a symbol of God's unwavering faithfulness and God's infinite capacity to provide for God's people. In a sense, our independent country is also provided by God when our forefathers lifted their flags and sent their sons to battle fields.

Just as the ram was provided in the nick of time, God provide victory for our nation in God's perfect timing. It may not always be in the way we expect or desire, but God's provision will always be abundant and sufficient.

God rewards our motives and love.

Why did our ancestors receive an independent country as a gift from God? Because we fought to build a community where everybody can enjoy "the unalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." God saw our motive and allowed us to have such undeniable rights of life, liberty, and pursuit of happiness.

Why did Abraham receive his son back and many other descendants? Because Abraham believed that God could create the world out of nothing and give life to those who are dead (Romans 4:17).

When we have a motive acceptable to God, God will give us reward. Jesus said, "And whoever gives one of these little ones even a cup of cold water because he is a disciple, truly, I say to you, he will by no means lose his reward." These simple yet powerful words reveal the heart of faith principles. The smallest acts of kindness out of compassion will not go unnoticed or unrewarded by God.

Jesus did not ask us to have grand achievements. Just a humble act, like offering a cup of water to someone in need, carries great significance in the eyes of God. It is not the magnitude of the deed that determines its worth, but the purity of our motives and the love that we pour into it that matters.

Brothers and sisters, let these words of Jesus inspire us to continue our faithful works, knowing that God sees every act of compassion, generosity, and service we offer in His name. Our actions may not be heroic like the forefathers or Abraham. Even when the world may overlook our efforts, our Heavenly Father never

does. He keeps a record of every good work, and He promises to reward us according to His perfect wisdom and grace.

However, let us not be mistaken. The reward Jesus speaks of extends far beyond earthly recognition or material gain. While those may come as a result of our faithful works, the ultimate reward lies in the freedom from sin and death that Jesus has secured for us through His sacrifice on the cross.

In Christ, we find forgiveness, redemption, and eternal life. Our reward is the joy of being reconciled with our Heavenly Father, experiencing His unending love, and dwelling in His presence forever. This is the reward that surpasses all earthly treasures and temporal pleasures.

On this Independence Sunday, let us resolve to be free from the power of sin and death. Let us not simply hear these words and go about our lives unchanged. Instead, let us be moved to action, fueled by the knowledge that our deeds, no matter how small, have eternal significance.

May we look for opportunities to extend a helping hand, to offer a word of encouragement, and to share the love of Christ with those around us. Let us be known as a community that seeks to bless others, not for our own glory, but to glorify the name of our Heavenly Father.

May our lives be a testimony to the transforming power of Christ's love, and may the world see through our actions that we are truly free from the power of sin and death.
