

"I WILL SHOW YOU HOW TO FISH FOR PEOPLE" Mark 1:14-20

We are reflecting on the vision statement of our annual conference: "Following Jesus, Thriving in Community, and Healing the World." We have discussed on the meaning of following Jesus.

To follow Jesus, we have to bear our own crosses. We need to sacrifice our time, talent, treasure to testify Jesus. We made a new year's resolution that we would give our time (attending to worship and meetings), talent (serving in committees and mission events), and treasure (tithing and giving pledges) to give testimony to God's love for the world.

To thrive in a community, we need to know our community. We also pray for our community's well-being and peace. Then we find one thing that we can do well in the community. As individuals, you have found ministry for the unhoused people, mentally ill, people with addictions, seniors, or youth and children. As a church, we have focused on education, music ministry, and being a community center.

Today and next week, we are going to reflect on healing the world. We will see how Jesus healed the world. Here is the Gospel text for today.

Jesus proclaimed that God's Kingdom is here already. After John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee announcing God's good news, saying, "Now is the time! Here comes God's kingdom! Change your hearts and lives and trust this good news!"

Then Jesus saw two brothers, Simon and Andrew, throwing fishing nets into the sea, for they were fishermen. "Come, follow me," he said, "and I'll show you how to fish for people." Right away, they left their nets and followed him. After going a little farther, he saw James and John, Zebedee's sons, in their boat repairing the fishing nets. At that very moment he called them. They followed him, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired workers.

From this text, we can find four steps to heal the world.

- 1. Change your heart.
- 2. Change your lives.
- 3. Trust this good news.
- 4. Call people to follow Jesus.

Change your heart.

First, we have to change our heart. Our hearts are full of anxieties, worries, fears, and anger. We do not know what is going to happen in the world. When we watch TV news, we feel that the world is going to end, and we cannot do anything for the world community. Those feelings come from our survival instinct. We have this fight, flight, and freeze instinct when we go through traumas in life.

Many of us have gone through life challenges. Loss of loved ones, relationship challenges, broken promises, unfulfilled dreams, and uncertain future have cornered us to do something that made us regret. Many times, we feel helpless and powerless without knowing why we are here and now.

The first step in healing the world is to change our hearts. In other words, we have to change our perspectives and views. Challenges in life are opportunities for us to grow and bear fruit. This statement would be hard to swallow but we have to accept it and face it. People usually say that what does not break us would make us strong. It is the same idea. In the Bible, we have many examples. Think about Joseph who was sold as slaves, imprisoned with false accusations, and forgotten for many years before he was summoned and became the prime minister of Egypt.

We must know that we are God's children. God has not forgotten us. Whatever we are going through, our lives are not done yet. All those crises and difficulties will be fertilizers for my fruits in life. Once we change our perspective on challenges, we should not lose heart and become fearful or angry.

The Lord is my shepherd, and I shall not want. What can separate us from the love of God? Nothing! God says, I will be with you, and I will walk with you. Do not be afraid and do not be dismayed. Read the Bible and meditate on those promises. Do not just read news articles and social media postings. Read the Bible to find out 365 promises that God makes for you and me. Memorize them and change your heart.

Change your lives.

The second step is to change your lives. If you are using substances to feel better, quit them. Go to AA, FA, NA, SA meetings. If you feel desperate, find small groups or form small groups. Stay with people of faith and share their faith in small groups. Participate in their mission and ministries. Volunteer in the Family Promise, St. Mary's Community Services, Church committees, and Events. Make a financial plan for how to get out of debts. Make a personal plan for how to take time to do exercise. Act as if you are royal children of God's Kingdom. Keep your pride as God's children. Do not beg. Do not wander around. Be focused and disciplined. Tackle a job and finish it step by step and bit by bit. Say, "If pastor Lee can preach in English, I can do everything."

Learning a second language is difficult, but doable. It is doable but it takes long time and repetitive practice. We are born sinners and speaking negative language with negative accents. That is why we have anxieties, worries, fears, and anger. We fight or flight or freeze. That is our native accent. Unless we learn divine language as our second language, we speak fluently those sinful native languages. "I cannot do it." "It is not possible." "We will not make it." All those sentences are our sinful native languages. We need to learn how to say, "I can do it with God's help," "Nothing is impossible in God," "We will make it because God is with us." Some new vocabularies and accents should be practiced over and over again to be comfortable in saying these.

Trust this good news.

We can get there with God. So many ancestors have proven it. So many fellow Christians have demonstrated it. We will be free from guilt and shame, fear and anger, worries and anxieties. Trust this good news and keep practicing it.

People will whisper in your ears that you cannot do it. You are helpless. You are done. You will not make it. However, those are not from God. Those words are from those who want to destroy you. They will attack you with all those negative remarks. But Jesus declared already. "Do not be afraid. I have won the victory."

Call People to Follow Jesus

In the pursuit of global healing, our focus must shift to the transformative power of individual change. While the journey may be protracted, it stands as an unwavering method to mend the world. The metamorphosis of one person's heart and life serves as the catalyst for a broader societal transformation. Reflecting on our progress prompts contemplation: a century ago, slavery was accepted, and women were denied the right to vote. Today, we've evolved to reject the notion of owning others and strive for gender equality in various spheres. The march towards equality in terms of gender, race, and other societal divisions is ongoing. The paradigm shift occurs one person at a time, reminiscent of a transformational narrative akin to Charles Dickens' Scrooge or Dr. Seuss' Grinch.

Delving into the realm of quantum physics, a captivating parallel arises. Quantum entanglement, a peculiar phenomenon, describes particles linked in such a way that their destinies are intertwined, regardless of vast distances. This entanglement involves a shared quantum state, where the fate of one particle instantaneously influences the other. Though Einstein labeled it "spooky action at a distance," entanglement doesn't breach the speed of light; rather, it is a shared state, akin to a two-headed coin where both outcomes are determined simultaneously.

The analogy extends to the realm of human behavior. Altering one's attitude and thoughts generates a positive impact on others. This seemingly small change initiates a ripple effect, akin to the butterfly effect or the entanglement observed in quantum physics. Beyond mere human effort, it implies a divine will at work. Entrust in God and fulfill your role: maintain a pure heart, adhere to honest practices, and engage in acts of kindness, inviting others to join our Christian community. Through these collective efforts, we contribute to the healing of the world. May God bless all those engaged in these small acts of healing! Amen.

Lent is a time for Christians to prepare their hearts and minds for the celebration of Easter, the holiest day in the Christian calendar. It's a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice and a call to follow his teachings. By taking time for reflection, repentance, and renewal, Christians can deepen their faith and prepare for the joy of Easter.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, and ends on Holy Saturday, March 28th, the day before Easter Sunday.
