## SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "JESUS IS THE SAVIOR, KING, AND SACRIFICE"

#### **Follow Jesus**

As we usher in the New Year with hopes and resolutions, let us not forget the transformative power of following Jesus. In a world historically divided between "before Jesus" and "after Jesus," our Annual Conference's vision statement, "Following Jesus, Thriving in Community, and Healing the World," takes center stage. Today, I delve into the profound meaning of "Following Jesus."

In the era preceding Jesus, societies were governed by rigid laws, creating distinctions between insiders and outsiders, haves and have-nots, and men and women. Yet, as Paul articulates in Galatians 3:28, "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

For some, this assertion may be startling. In a world marked by Palestinian-Israeli tensions, political partisanship, and immigration debates, divisions persist. Nevertheless, in Christ Jesus, these divisions dissolve. The call is to learn to love and coexist amidst differences—a true manifestation of the Savior's purpose. Jesus liberates us from negative feelings rooted in human divisions.

The Bible declares a simple truth that nullifies these divisions: we are all God's children, bearing His image. While acknowledging human imperfections, this recognition allows us to embrace humility. We can admit our fallibility, consider alternative perspectives, and empathize with others—an embodiment of the humility Jesus displayed by taking on human form.

In this spirit of humility, we can approach the birth of Jesus much like the Magi did. These wise individuals, potentially kings or scholars from distant places, transcended ethnic, geographical, and religious boundaries to worship a Jewish king. Their focus was not on the baby's ethnicity or social class but on the anticipated outcome: world peace and well-being.

Contrastingly, King Herod lacked such vision. Disturbed by the news of a potential rival king, he sought information from religious authorities but harbored ulterior motives. Herod's duplicity serves as a cautionary tale, a reminder that not everyone welcomes the transformative vision that Jesus brings.

As we navigate the challenges of a new year, let us heed the profound message of Following Jesus—embracing unity amidst diversity, extending love despite divisions, and aspiring toward a vision of peace and well-being for all.

#### The Crucial Cost of Following a Vision

In the pursuit of profound change, knowledge alone falls short. It is the willingness to pay the price that truly defines our ability to follow a transformative path, a lesson exemplified in the story of King Herod and his knowledge of Jesus' birthplace.

King Herod, armed with knowledge from scholars, was aware of the divine significance of Jesus' arrival. Yet, his knowledge did not deter him from hatching a plot against the very embodiment of God's will. This historical anecdote serves as a striking parallel to contemporary leaders who possess ample information about pressing global issues, such as climate change and poverty.

In our world, equipped with an abundance of resources and knowledgeable scholars, the impediment to progress often lies not in the lack of information but in the willingness to collaborate and make sacrifices for the greater good. The question becomes: Are leaders prepared to work together, to coexist in pursuit of shared solutions?

This challenge is underscored by the stark reality that some developing nations aspire to bridge the gap and elevate their living standards, akin to their Western counterparts. Simultaneously, certain developed nations

must temper their rapid progress to effect meaningful change on a global scale. However, the pervasive force of greed disrupts this delicate balance.

The imperative to live together harmoniously demands a price — a commitment to collective action, a willingness to compromise, and a recognition that progress necessitates sacrifice. While knowledge lays the foundation, it is the readiness to pay the price that propels us towards a future where nations collaborate, setting aside individual interests for the collective well-being of our shared planet. In a world grappling with critical issues, the question remains: Are we, as leaders and as a society, willing to pay the price to truly live together and effect meaningful change?

The Price of Following Jesus - Beyond the Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh
As we embark on the first Sunday of 2024, the story of the Magi's gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh takes on a contemporary resonance. Their symbolic offerings carry profound meaning for those considering the cost of following Jesus.

Gold, often equated with money, becomes a metaphor for financial contributions to church ministries. The plea is clear: supporting our ministries requires a tangible commitment, beyond attending services. Pledges and offerings sustain not only worship spaces but also vital programs like the Homeless mission, Youth Ministry, Children's programs, and more. It's a reminder that financial support ensures the lights stay on and the doors open for these impactful initiatives.

People donate money for good causes, like Homeless mission, Youth Ministry, Children's program, senior programs, single ministry, young adult gatherings, but they do not pay money for the electricity bills and cleaning bills. However, where do they meet when we provide those ministries? They meet at our church buildings, and we need to maintain the buildings and pay the bills. Your offering actually makes these ministries possible when you make your pledges. I want to give thanks to all those who made pledges. Let me make you all stand up who made pledges more than 50 years continually for our church! Let us give them a round of plauds. I also want to recognize the first-time pledgers. Thank you for your trust in our church. We will faithfully manage your offering to do our ministry.

Frankincense is prayer. We have a prayer chain team. We also have people who knit prayer shawls. We have people who deliver those shawls to shut-ins or to those who had surgeries. We also have people who pray for the ministries. I want to have a prayer team who pray during our worship hours for the Spirit to come down on every worshipper. If you want to be prayer warriors during worship times, let me know. We need two teams, one for 8:30 AM and one for 11 AM. If you go 8:30 AM service, please pray for 11 AM for an hour. If you go at 11 AM, please pray for 8:30 AM service for an hour. We will post all the church gatherings and you can pray during those meetings or gatherings.

Myrrh symbolizes sacrifice. Many of us sacrifice our time to do volunteer work. We all enjoy power point presentation during worship times. It all started with the sacrificial volunteer work of the Rev. Mark Wharff. He donated his time to make artistic and careful power point slides every week. We all enjoy quality sound during worship. Mr. Cooper and Mr. David Campero donate their time every Sunday without failure. Some think that they are paid staff because they show up every Sunday. However, I call those three persons, Three Wise Men of our church. However, there are many volunteers other than those three. They give their time and talents in addition to their treasures. In this time, we have to make them all go through the live scan and fingerprinting to protect children and youth. It is like myrrh. However, they still do that to support our ministry. If you are doing any volunteer work, please raise your hands. Let us give them a big round of plauds also.

## Following Jesus means to humbly give our gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

The message is clear: Following Jesus demands more than a passive acknowledgment. It requires active participation and sacrificial giving of gold, frankincense, and myrrh—symbolizing financial, spiritual, and personal commitments. In the words of Jesus, understanding the cost before building a house is crucial. The grace may be free, but the commitment to share the good news demands our conscious and informed decision.

So, as we step into 2024, let us embrace the call to sacrifice with joy and gladness, aware of the costs and resolute in our commitment to follow Jesus. Amen.

#### **FOOD PANTRY**

The food pantry shelves are getting bare. We could use your help filling them. Here are some guidelines to help you pick items for the closet. *Everything needs to be no cook items!* The people we serve do not have access to cooking facilities or can openers or refrigerator space. *Please do not empty your cupboards or fridge or give us anything that is expired, legally we can't use it. We rarely serve families, and we direct them to the Emergency Food Bank. <u>Sometimes the cheapest and easiest way to get these items is to go through Amazon and have it sent directly to the church!</u>* 

Here are our immediate needs:

Tuna (with a pull tab to open or packets of tuna that can be easily opened.)

Water bottles 16 oz. size

<u>juice</u> (apple, orange) small sizes

<u>canned soups</u> (with pull tabs that can be opened and eaten without water or heat.)

Vienna Sausage with pull tabs

Raisins, small boxes

milk (shelf stable, small sizes)

Cereal individual servings

Pudding cups in any flavor

Cup O' Noodles or something similar

If you have any packets of utensils with napkins that they hand out in some fast-food places, we can use those too!
