The Certainty of Suffering: A Fundamental Truth

In the grand tapestry of human existence, there exists one undeniable constant: suffering. Much like a football team cannot escape its adversaries on the field, so too are we unable to evade the trials and tribulations that pepper the journey of life.

Even Jesus, in his omniscient wisdom, foresaw and acknowledged the inevitability of suffering. As he imparted his teachings to his disciples, he prophesied his own path, a path fraught with rejection, persecution, and ultimately, crucifixion.

We, as mere mortals, must come to terms with the unassailable truth that suffering will find us. While we cannot peer into the crystal ball of our future, we can fortify ourselves to withstand the trials that lie ahead. Through preparation and resilience, we equip ourselves with the strength necessary to confront life's inevitable adversities.

Yet, in moments of despair and when our own strength falters, we find solace in the presence of Jesus, who walks alongside us, offering comfort and fortitude in the midst of our suffering. In his divine companionship, we discover the resilience to endure, knowing that we are not alone in our struggles.

Embracing the Promise of Resurrection

In the realm beyond mortality, one certainty awaits: resurrection. This profound truth, articulated by Jesus himself, transcends earthly bounds and offers a beacon of hope amidst the shadows of death. With unwavering conviction, Jesus foretold his resurrection after three days, a declaration met with skepticism and disbelief, even from his closest disciples.

Peter, in a moment of doubt and fear, dared to challenge Jesus' proclamation of resurrection. Έπιτιμάω (Epitimaō): This verb, used by Peter, translates to "rebuke," "reprimand," or "forbid." It carries a sense of silencing or stopping someone from doing something considered wrong or inappropriate. Here, Peter attempts to silence Jesus from saying what Peter deems an unacceptable prediction.

His rebuke stemmed from a lack of faith in the possibility of life beyond the grave. Unable to comprehend the divine plan unfolding before him, Peter sought to silence Jesus, clinging to his own vision of earthly glory and power.

Yet, Jesus remained steadfast in his purpose, resolute in his conviction that resurrection would follow death. His voluntary sacrifice upon the cross was not the end, but rather the beginning of a profound spiritual truth that would reshape humanity's understanding of life and death.

For those who embrace the promise of resurrection, death loses its sting and despair gives way to hope. Jesus, in his resurrection, offers a new perspective on the transient nature of earthly existence, inviting all who believe to transcend the limitations of mortal life and glimpse the eternal truths that lie beyond.

In a world plagued by uncertainty and fear, the certainty of resurrection offers solace and reassurance. It is a reminder that death is not the final chapter, but rather a gateway to new beginnings and endless possibilities. In embracing this truth, we discover a profound sense of purpose and meaning that transcends the fleeting concerns of this world.

Unmasking Satan's Deception

Satan, the eternal adversary, employs a cunning strategy to deceive humanity, convincing us that earthly existence is the pinnacle of life. Yet, we must not succumb to this illusion. Just as the disappointment of losing one Super Bowl does not signify the end of all victories, so too does death not signal the cessation of life. Beyond the veil of mortality lies the promise of resurrection and a new existence.

Armed with this profound truth, fear of death loses its grip, empowering individuals to embrace noble causes with unwavering courage. Throughout history, towering figures such as Abraham Lincoln and Martin Luther King Jr. exemplified this courage, risking their lives in pursuit of justice and equality.

Contrary to misconceptions, belief in eternal life does not diminish the significance of the present. Rather, it emboldens believers to tirelessly labor in the service of building God's kingdom on earth. Those who embrace this truth are infused with a transformative courage that transcends earthly limitations, striving to manifest divine principles in the here and now.

Conversely, societies devoid of belief in eternal life often falter in their quest for justice and equality. The failed experiments of communist regimes serve as cautionary tales, illustrating the perils of attempting to construct utopian societies without reverence for transcendent truths.

The Divergent Paths of Ideals: Communism vs. Christianity

At first glance, the communist and Christian movements may appear to share common ground in their aspirations for a society founded on principles of equality and dignity for all. Both envision a community where basic human needs—shelter, food, healthcare, and meaningful work—are met with fairness and compassion.

However, the way these ideals are pursued diverges dramatically. Yet, Jesus' call to take up one's cross and follow him transcends mere symbolism; it demands a radical reorientation of priorities and a willingness to relinquish worldly attachments in pursuit of a higher purpose. This ethos stands in direct opposition to the materialistic ethos of those who prioritize personal gain over collective well-being.

Contrary to Karl Marx's assertion that faith in eternal life breeds complacency, history bears witness to the transformative power of such faith. Those who believe in the promise of eternal life have demonstrated a remarkable capacity for courage and selflessness, often risking their lives to advance the cause of justice and righteousness.

Those who believe only in this life and material resources did not hesitate to kill others and take possessions of others. They do not want to sacrifice their own time, talents, and treasure. They want others to give up their time, talents, and treasure.

During the season of Lent, let us reflect on the sacrifices we are called to make in service of a better world—a world guided by the principles of compassion, justice, and solidarity. For it is through such sacrifices that we lay the groundwork for a future imbued with hope and dignity, both in this life and beyond. May God be with us in this work! Amen!

LENT: A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND RENEWAL

Lent is a 40-day period of solemn observance in the Christian calendar that comes before Easter. It's a time for reflection, repentance, and spiritual growth, commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting and being tempted in the wilderness before beginning his public ministry.

Lent is a time for Christians to prepare their hearts and minds for the celebration of Easter, the holiest day in the Christian calendar. It's a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice and a call to follow his teachings. By taking time for reflection, repentance, and renewal, Christians can deepen their faith and prepare for the joy of Easter.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, and ends on Holy Saturday, March 28th, the day before Easter Sunday.

There are many ways Christians observe Lent, but some common practices include:

Prayer and reflection: Christians may spend more time in prayer and meditation, attending special church services, and reading scripture.

Fasting and abstinence: Many Christians choose to give up something they enjoy, such as meat, sweets, or social media, as a way to focus on their spiritual life. Others may choose to fast from food or drink for certain periods.

Almsgiving: Lent is a time to remember those in need and to practice generosity. Christians may donate to charity, volunteer their time, or perform acts of kindness for others.
