First Sunday of Lent

Today is the first Sunday of Lent, a season of introspection and spiritual preparation leading up to Easter Sunday. For us, these forty days symbolize a journey toward renewal, a chance to purify our hearts and scrutinize our lifestyles in anticipation of joining the ranks of the resurrected.

Baptism of Jesus

Although Jesus, as the sinless Son of God, had no need for repentance, his decision to partake in baptism conveyed a powerful message. It affirmed the sanctity of John's baptism as a sacred rite, a pathway toward spiritual purification accessible to all. In embracing this ritual, Jesus laid the foundation for the sacrament of baptism as a cornerstone of Christian faith, signifying our entry into God's loving embrace and our incorporation into the community of believers.

The Gospel accounts recount the momentous occasion of Jesus' baptism in vivid detail. As he emerged from the waters of the Jordan River, the heavens themselves seemed to part, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in the form of a dove. A voice from above resonated, proclaiming, "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased." This divine affirmation underscored Jesus' identity as the beloved of God, imbuing him with the assurance and strength necessary to fulfill his divine calling.

Our Encounter with God

In our own journeys of faith, such encounters with the boundless love of God serve as foundational pillars. As a member of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry, I had two-days retreat interviewing 8 candidates. We heard their stories of calling, examine the psychological evaluation and recommendations, and discussed whether the candidates were fit to the local church ministry. Whether interviewing candidates for ministry or

enlisting volunteers within our local congregations, it's essential to ascertain whether individuals have encountered the transformative love of God.

Without this vital connection, the rigors of service can lead to burnout, frustration, and disillusionment. Yet, when rooted in a living relationship with the divine, our acts of service are infused with joy and resilience. Jesus' baptism serves as a poignant reminder of this truth, urging us to seek out those moments of profound encounter with God that sustain us in our service to others.

Spiritual Disciplines.

Following his baptism, Jesus was thrust into the wilderness, where he grappled with temptation. Amidst the desolation, he faced trials that tested not only his resolve but also his spiritual fortitude. It's a narrative that resonates deeply, not only in biblical context but also in the contemporary realm of human experience.

In scrutinizing candidates for various roles, particularly within the realm of ministry, we are compelled to assess their capacity to navigate adversity. For every congregation, conflict is an inevitable reality. Yet, like Jesus, those called to leadership must possess the resilience to transform life's lemons into lemon juice.

Jesus' trials in the wilderness serve as a blueprint for confronting the multifaceted challenges of existence. His initial test, one of physical deprivation, mirrors the material scarcities and financial constraints encountered by many. Yet, Jesus countered this trial by affirming the primacy of spiritual sustenance, asserting that life transcends mere sustenance, drawing nourishment from the eternal words of God.

Similarly, Jesus confronted the allure of fame, resisting the temptation to perform sensational acts for the sake of acclaim. Instead, he anchored himself in the unwavering certainty of divine love, recognizing that external validation paled in comparison to the intimate communion with God.

The final trial, one of power and dominion, echoes the perennial human temptation to wield authority for personal gain. Yet, Jesus steadfastly upheld the sovereignty of God, refusing to succumb to the allure of earthly power. For him, true servitude meant channeling one's influence towards the betterment of others, affirming the supremacy of divine authority above all.

As aspirants to spiritual leadership, we are called to emulate Jesus' example, grounding our service in a steadfast commitment to God's will. Before assuming positions of influence, we must undertake a rigorous examination of our hearts, ensuring that our motivations are rooted in humility and devotion rather than self-aggrandizement.

Jesus Announces the Good News

Following his baptism and triumphant navigation of temptation's treacherous terrain, Jesus received word of John the Baptist's imprisonment. Yet, far from retreating or hesitating, Jesus embarked on a new phase of his ministry with unwavering resolve. In Galilee, he proclaimed the arrival of God's kingdom, urging all to repent and embrace the good news.

This transition, from John's ministry to Jesus' active proclamation, illustrates a timeless truth embedded within the fabric of divine mission. Just as Joshua succeeded Moses in the Old Testament, so too does a new generation invariably rise to carry forward the mantle of leadership when the torchbearers of yesteryears step aside. When John was imprisoned, it was the time for Jesus to start his public ministry.

In the ebb and flow of life within our local congregations, we witness this cyclical pattern unfold time and again. As one chapter draws to a close, another begins, marked by the emergence of fresh faces and voices eager to heed God's call.

This perpetual cycle of renewal underscores a fundamental truth: the church is not bound by the limitations of individual lifetimes or tenures. Rather, it thrives on the enduring call of God, beckoning forth servants from every generation to play their part in advancing the divine mission.

As we journey through this Lenten season, let us heed this timeless message of continuity and renewal. Let us reaffirm the sacred vows of our baptism, recalling the grace bestowed upon us as we answer the call to serve. Through spiritual disciplines such as fasting, prayer, and diligent study of Scripture, may we fortify ourselves against the temptations of worldly allurements—be it wealth, fame, or power.

Yet, in our pursuit of faithful service, let us also acknowledge the inherent limitations of our human agency. We may sow the seeds of God's kingdom, but it is ultimately in the hands of the divine to bring forth the harvest. As we labor in our various roles, let us do so with humility, trusting in God's providence to guide and sustain us.

This is my mantra that I recite every day in my ministry:

I am not God. I am just a servant of God. I have no power. I have no plans of my own. I trust God and I follow God. This helps me to remind that it is God's ministry and not mine. When we have a disappointing outcome, we give glory to God. God is the only one who controls the outcome. May God bless you also with such faith and trust! Amen.

LENT: A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND RENEWAL

Lent is a 40-day period of solemn observance in the Christian calendar that comes before Easter. It's a time for reflection, repentance, and spiritual growth, commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting and being tempted in the wilderness before beginning his public ministry.

Lent is a time for Christians to prepare their hearts and minds for the celebration of Easter, the holiest day in the Christian calendar. It's a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice and a call to follow his teachings. By taking time for reflection, repentance, and renewal, Christians can deepen their faith and prepare for the joy of Easter.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, and ends on Holy Saturday, March 28th, the day before Easter Sunday.

There are many ways Christians observe Lent, but some common practices include:

Prayer and reflection: Christians may spend more time in prayer and meditation, attending special church services, and reading scripture.

Fasting and abstinence: Many Christians choose to give up something they enjoy, such as meat, sweets, or social media, as a way to focus on their spiritual life. Others may choose to fast from food or drink for certain periods.

Almsgiving: Lent is a time to remember those in need and to practice generosity. Christians may donate to charity, volunteer their time, or perform acts of kindness for others.
