Sermon in a nutshell: "Jesus is Risen!" Easter Service (Mark 16:1-8)

Empty Tomb

The Bible told us that the tomb where the body of Jesus was laid was empty. No body disputed the fact that the tomb was empty. This is the biblical account in Mark 16:1-8.

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they could go and anoint Jesus' dead body. Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they came to the tomb. They were saying to each other, "Who's going to roll the stone away from the entrance for us?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone had been rolled away. (And it was a very large stone!) Going into the tomb, they saw a young man in a white robe seated on the right side; and they were startled. But he said to them, "Don't be alarmed! You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised. He isn't here. Look, here's the place where they laid him. Go, tell his disciples, especially Peter, that he is going ahead of you into Galilee. You will see him there, just as he told you." Overcome with terror and dread, they fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

Empty tomb mystery

In scrutinizing the enigma of the empty tomb following the crucifixion of Jesus, various conjectures have been posited to explicate this pivotal event. Chief among these theories are:

Firstly, the proposition that the disciples clandestinely absconded with the body is met with logical skepticism. The formidable barrier of the heavy stone obstructing the tomb's entrance, typically requiring a cohort of 5-6 men for displacement, coupled with the vigilance of Roman sentinels overseeing the site, renders such a feat implausible. Furthermore, the disciples' incredulity upon learning of the empty tomb belies the notion of their complicity in an elaborate charade.

Secondly, the notion of Roman soldiers pilfering the body lacks cogency upon closer examination. Not only would such an act incur severe punishment upon discovery of the empty sepulcher, but the soldiers possessed the means to refute any claims of Jesus' resurrection by presenting his remains.

Similarly, the suggestion that Jewish adversaries orchestrated the disappearance of the body fails to withstand scrutiny. Like their Roman counterparts, they too could have easily produced the body to discredit assertions of Jesus' resurrection.

A more incredulous assertion posits that Jesus, though crucified, somehow managed to survive his ordeal and absconded from the tomb. However, the severity of crucifixion, historically recognized as an invariably fatal punishment, discounts the plausibility of this scenario. Moreover, the physical exertion required to displace the stone seal and effectuate an escape is incongruous with the condition of one subjected to such torment.

Finally, the proposition of Jesus' resurrection itself emerges as a compelling explanation. This hypothesis posits that Jesus, in a transcendent state following his crucifixion, was able to traverse physical barriers and manifest himself to his followers. The accounts of his appearances in various locales, unimpeded by locked doors, serve to bolster this assertion. Moreover, such a narrative accord with theological tenets regarding the nature of resurrection and the promise of an incorruptible body in Christian eschatology.

In summation, while various conjectures have been proffered to account for the enigma of the empty tomb, the hypothesis of Jesus' resurrection emerges as the most cogent explanation, supported by both historical accounts and theological considerations.

Women (Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome) Witnesses

In antiquity, societal norms often marginalized the credibility of women as witnesses, favoring men of esteemed status to validate accounts. However, in the narrative of the empty tomb, the initial report of the resurrection by Mark features women, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, whose societal standing would

typically render their testimony suspect. This unconventional choice suggests a commitment to truth rather than fabrication, as employing a male witness of higher societal regard would have been more persuasive if the intent were to fabricate a story.

Moreover, their genuine astonishment upon encountering the angel underscores the authenticity of their experience. Their disbelief in the possibility of resurrection, evident in their reaction, militates against the notion of a contrived narrative. The inclusion of such details detracts from the credibility of any attempt to dismiss the resurrection as a fabrication, as it would be counterintuitive to incorporate elements incongruent with prevailing beliefs if the aim were deceit. Thus, their encounter with an angel stands as a compelling testament to the historicity of the resurrection.

Jesus is Risen!

The conjunction of the physical evidence of the empty tomb and the testimony of credible witnesses like women provides a compelling foundation upon which to place faith in the resurrection of Jesus Christ and, by extension, in the promise of our own resurrection after death.

Jesus, as the inaugural beneficiary of resurrection, serves as the harbinger of our own eventual triumph over death. His resurrection not only validates the veracity of his teachings but also extends a promise of eternal life to all who believe in him.

Thus, the empty tomb stands not as a symbol of finality, but rather as a portal to a new realm of existence. Death loses its sting, and the prospect of an everlasting communion with God becomes a tangible reality. Through faith in Jesus Christ, we can embrace the assurance of our own resurrection and the prospect of an eternal life filled with divine grace and fellowship.
