SERMON IN A NUTSHELL: "DO NOT MAKE GOD'S HOUSE A BUSINESS PLACE." (John 2:13-22) Pastor Lee

Jesus in Jerusalem at Passover

In the biblical narrative, Jesus is depicted as being present at the Jerusalem temple during the time of Passover. The significance of his presence in the temple during this festival can be understood within the context of Jewish religious practices and traditions.

As a devout Jewish man, Jesus adhered to the requirement of making pilgrimage to the temple in Jerusalem three times a year, as outlined in the scriptures. Passover, the first of these festivals, holds particular importance as it commemorates the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. It typically occurs in the spring season, coinciding with the barley harvest.

In the Bible, three major festivals called the **Shalosh Regalim** (Three Pilgrimage Festivals) mandated Jewish men to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem:

Passover (Pesach): Celebrating the Israelites' liberation from slavery in Egypt, it occurs in spring and coincides with the **barley harvest**.

Shavuot (Feast of Weeks): Commemorating the giving of the Torah (Five Books of Moses) at Mount Sinai, it takes place 49 days after Passover and aligns with the **wheat harvest**.

Sukkot (Feast of Booths): Marking the Israelites' wandering in the desert after their Exodus from Egypt, it falls in autumn and coincides with the **fruit harvest**.

The observance of Passover, along with the other festivals, was not solely focused on agricultural rituals; rather, it encompassed spiritual renewal, communal gathering, and the reaffirmation of the covenant between God and the Jewish people. Pilgrims from various regions would converge upon Jerusalem, bringing offerings to the temple and participating in sacred ceremonies. These occasions served as opportunities for worship, reflection, and communal rejoicing.

Why Jesus was mad at the people in the temple?

During the time leading up to the Jewish Passover, Jesus traveled to Jerusalem. Upon arriving at the temple, he encountered a scene that displeased him greatly. Rather than finding a place of reverence and spiritual devotion, Jesus found the temple being used for commercial purposes. Merchants were selling animals for sacrifice and exchanging currency within the temple grounds.

Reacting with righteous indignation, Jesus took decisive action. He crafted a whip from ropes and proceeded to drive out the merchants and their livestock from the temple. He overturned the tables of the currency exchangers, scattering their coins. Addressing those selling doves, he admonished them, declaring, "Get these things out of here! Don't make my Father's house a place of business."

This incident reveals Jesus' deep concern for the sanctity of the temple and the purity of worship. He was angered by the commercialization of what should have been a sacred space dedicated to prayer and spiritual reflection. Instead of honoring the significance of the Passover as a time of spiritual renewal and connection with God, the people had turned it into a commercial enterprise.

In essence, Jesus was condemning the prioritization of material gain over spiritual matters. His actions underscored the importance of maintaining reverence and devotion in religious practices, rather than allowing them to be overshadowed by worldly concerns. This episode serves as a timeless reminder to prioritize the spiritual essence of religious observances over materialistic pursuits, a message that resonates even in contemporary society, where holidays like Christmas and Easter can become overshadowed by commercialism.

Let us cleanse our own temple!

In addressing the need to rectify the wrongdoing witnessed in the temple, Jesus provides a profound example of restoration and renewal. He emphasizes the importance of reviving genuine spiritual devotion and breathing life back into religious practices.

Drawing from the teachings of Jesus, we learn that the mere adherence to religious forms is insufficient; true significance lies in the transformative power these practices have on individuals and society as a whole. This sentiment echoes the words of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, who expressed concern not only for the survival of religious institutions but also for their impact on the wider community.

The dialogue between Jesus and the Jewish leaders further illuminates this theme. When questioned about the authority behind his actions, Jesus responds enigmatically, proclaiming that if the temple were destroyed, he would raise it up in three days. Although the leaders interpret his words literally, Jesus is referring metaphorically to his own body as the true temple.

In reflecting on this exchange, we recognize the need to undergo a spiritual transformation akin to the rebuilding of a temple. Just as Jesus spoke of raising up the temple of his body, we are called to cleanse our souls during the season of Lent, where the Holy Spirit dwells within us. By purifying our hearts and minds, we create a sacred space for the presence of God to flourish, enabling genuine spiritual growth and the bearing of fruits that reflect our faith.

In essence, Jesus' teachings compel us to move beyond mere ritualistic observance and instead cultivate a vibrant, living faith that impacts both our individual lives and the world around us. As we embark on this journey of spiritual renewal, may we heed the lessons of Jesus and strive to embody the true essence of religious devotion.
