Sermon in a nutshell: "Peace be with You!" (John 20:19-31)

The Bible is written to help us to believe in Jesus as our savior and Lord.

In the Gospel of John, it concludes, "Then Jesus did many other miraculous signs in his disciples' presence, signs that aren't recorded in this scroll. But these things are written so that you will believe that Jesus is the Christ, God's Son, and that believing, you will have life in his name."

Here, the intent behind the biblical narrative becomes vividly apparent. Its primary aim is to foster belief in Jesus as the Christ, God's own Son. Why is this belief so pivotal? Because through it, one finds life, imbued with profound significance and purpose.

Evidence and Proofs are given to help us to have faith in Jesus.

The pages of the Bible resonate with evidence and validation of Jesus' divine authority. Each miracle recounted serves as a testament to his boundless power. Every teaching attributed to him underscores his compassion, mirroring the very essence of divine mercy towards the downtrodden and despondent. Every action chronicled exemplifies the tangible expression of God's love for humanity, manifested through Jesus' earthly ministry.

Here is an example how Thomas came to believe in Jesus.

Thomas, known also as Didymus, one of the Twelve, was absent when Jesus appeared before the disciples. Upon hearing disciples' testimonies, he remained skeptical, demanding tangible proof: "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands, put my finger in the wounds left by the nails, and put my hand into his side, I won't believe."

Eight days later, within the confines of a locked room, Jesus materialized once more. Addressing Thomas directly, he extended an invitation: "Put your finger here. Look at my hands. Put your hand into my side. No more disbelief. Believe!" Overwhelmed by this compassionate gesture, Thomas exclaims, "My Lord and my God!" To which Jesus responds, "Do you believe because you see me? Happy are those who don't see and yet believe."

The inclusion of the Thomas narrative within the biblical text serves as a poignant reminder of Jesus' compassionate outreach towards doubting hearts. It exemplifies the Gospel's overarching theme of care and concern for every seeker of truth.

What does it mean to believe in Jesus?

What defines the life of believers? It's a life characterized by forgiveness and peace, echoing with the resounding proclamation of harmony. On that pivotal evening, as shadows lengthened and fear gripped the disciples behind closed doors, Jesus breached their sanctuary. His presence, a beacon of reassurance, heralded a profound declaration: "Peace be with you."

Belief is A Call to Self-Sacrifice

Central to Jesus' message is the imperative of peace. Demonstrating this, he bared his scars, a tangible embodiment of the cost of peace. As the disciples beheld their resurrected Lord, their hearts swelled with jubilation. Through his wounds, Jesus illustrated that true peace emerges from the crucible of self-sacrifice. It is this selfless ethos that fosters reconciliation among diverse communities, bridging chasms of dissent and discord.

Reflecting on the legacy of Mahatma Gandhi offers poignant parallels. Through nonviolent resistance, Gandhi spearheaded India's quest for independence, eschewing the tools of aggression for the path of fasting and peaceful protest. His unwavering commitment to nonviolence captivated the world's attention, compelling the British government to reckon with his cause. Gandhi confessed that he learned this non-violence from Jesus.

Embracing the Path of Peaceful Advocacy

Conversely, history attests to the futility of violence in pursuit of justice. From the turbulent annals of communist revolutions to the haunting specter of terrorist atrocities, the legacy of violence is one marred by perpetual conflict and loss of innocent lives. Those who wield violence as a means of advocacy sow seeds of discord, perpetuating cycles of suffering and strife.

In the annals of peaceful advocacy, luminaries like Martin Luther King Jr. stand as exemplars of Jesus' teachings. Drawing inspiration from Gandhi's principles of nonviolent resistance, King championed the cause of civil rights through peaceful means, igniting a nationwide movement for racial equality. His adherence to the path of nonviolence, rooted in the teachings of Jesus, exemplifies the transformative potential of peaceable dissent.

In the crucible of human history, the life of Jesus offers a timeless blueprint for peace—a call to embrace the ethos of self-sacrifice and nonviolent advocacy. Through his example, we find the enduring promise of reconciliation and harmony, beckoning humanity towards a future imbued with the resplendent glow of peace.

A Call to Transformative Action: Insights from Jesus

In the gospel narrative, Jesus imparts a profound message to his disciples, echoing through the corridors of time: "Peace be with you. As the Father sent me, so I am sending you." This charge encapsulates the essence of Jesus' mission—his sacrificial journey, culminating in the crucible of the Cross. Just as Jesus embraced the path of self-sacrifice, his followers are summoned to tread a similar path, confronting challenges with resilience and fortitude.

In the bustling sphere of contemporary discourse, fostering a culture of non-violence resonates as an imperative ethos, whether within the sanctified walls of our church meetings, the intimate exchanges of familial dialogue, or the broader arena of domestic and international deliberations on contentious matters.
